## Molloy HS will Remember Karina Vetrano '04 with Event and Scholarship

As many of us know, Archbishop Molloy High School is built on the foundation of a dedicated and loving community. We're Stanners - a family. We collectively rejoice in moments of happiness and grieve together when tragedy strikes. This explains the despair that was felt when we lost a member of the Stanner family last year.

On August 2, 2016, Karina Vetrano '04 passed away. Soon after her death, a GoFundMe page was set up to raise reward money to coax someone with information on the crime into coming forward. After a six month investigation, a suspect was arrested. Even after the arrest, generous hearts continued to donate to the GoFundMe page. To this day, approximately \$291,890 was donated by 4,616 people. Karina's father, Mr. Phil Vetrano '74, is determined to pass on the money to causes Karina would support. Mr. Vetrano says the options include St. Jude's Research Hospital, the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, and Molloy. Only a modest portion of these funds will be sent to Molloy.

In addition to Mr. Vetrano's efforts, Molloy's Stanner Alumni Center wants to do more to honor Karina. Hopefully, in the near future, there will be a Karina Vetrano Memorial Scholarship for "deserving female students." An approximately 18-hour fundraiser akin to the Relay for Life has been planned to raise the necessary funds, \$100,000, for a potential scholarship. Mr. Rizzotti and the Alumni Center encourage participants to sign up for the specific times they want to join the efforts. The walk/run on the track will begin at 8 pm on Friday, June 23, 2017, and will go throughout the night into Saturday June 24th. On Saturday, there will be a morning Mass in Karina's honor and a brunch to follow. At that time, the school would like to dedicate a part of the campus to Karina.

Everyone is welcome to support the honoring of Karina Vetrano's legacy. The campaign to make this fundraiser a success will primarily be driven by social media, so be sure to spread the word! Sponsors are encouraged to donate on Molloy's website and runners should be sure to sign up there as well. Additionally, volunteers will be needed to help organize the event.

Although Karina is no longer with us in person, she will forever be with us in spirit. She will always be remembered as a valued member of Molloy's first historic co-ed class, the Class of 2004. While at Molloy, Karina was a determined student-athlete, leading the school to win the freshman Cross Country Intersectional City Championship. Most importantly, she was a beloved part our community, and will be dearly missed. The Karina Vetrano Scholarship is one of many ways her memory, and legacy, will live on.



On March 25th, two of the most devoted teachers in Molloy history were inducted into the Stanner Hall of Fame. This honor is so distinguished, that out of Molloy's 22,000+ graduates, there have been only about 100 inductees. In this special edition of Teacher Spotlights, Mr. Santos and Brother Aquinas shared how they felt about receiving such an honor.

Mr. Santos started teaching in 1970 and has dedicated his life to education. From a young age, Mr. Santos knew that he wanted to be a teacher due to the influence of Catholic education and religious role models, such as nuns and priests. Santos has always enjoyed working with kids and has been coaching them for 54 years too. At the age of 16, Mr. Santos began coaching and hasn't stopped since. As our JV softball coach, he has led the team to two city championships and ten division titles.

Mr. Santos also works with the Greater New York Sandlot Athletic Alliance to assist the

"sandlot youths" and he is a founding member of the Brother Ronald Marcellin Committee, which provides scholarships to students who are prevented from attending Molloy for various reasons. To be inducted into the Hall of Fame "is a surreal feeling," according to Mr. Santos. He tried not to focus on

the prestige that comes with being inducted, but he realizes that it's "an honor" to be pictured alongside the other inductees, such as Medal of Honor recipient Louis Willet, 9/11 first responders, and other people he described as "heroes." In his own words, "To be in that realm, what I do day by day, working with kids, teaching, coaching, and taking care of my family, how much better can it be?"

If you took biology in freshman year, chances are Brother Aquinas helped you with your labs! Starting as a Brother in 1948, Br. Aquinas has been working at Molloy since 1961 and has always had a

passion for teaching. He especially enjoys biology and has been assisting in the lab for the past 10 years even after retiring from teaching. When asked about his favorite lab, he responded saying, "my favorite lab would have to be the frog or pig dissection." Besides assisting in the lab, Br. Aquinas also coached Track and Field for about twenty years, leading the team to many championship titles. While coaching, he implemented the "Jog 5, Run 5, Jog 5" workouts and always encouraged his team to never give up. Due to his determined attitude and accomplishments as a coach, Br. Aquinas was later inducted into the CHSAA Hall of Fame. Br. Aquinas says he feels "very honored" to be inducted into the Stanner Hall of Fame because there are "a lot of distinguished members so it overall has been a nice experience."




